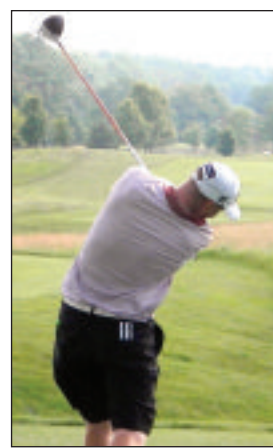

The third vigil in Fort Wayne in remembrance of those killed and wounded Sunday in Orlando, Fla., was held Wednesday at Swinney Park, 1700 Jefferson Blvd.

The more than 50 attendees held candles and walked slowly through the park to a bridge off Jefferson and back to a picnic area in the park.

A lone gunman killed 49 during a three-hour rampage at Pulse dance club before he was killed by police.

Two truck hubs, two lawsuits and a conflict of interest

AS THE NEWS-SENTINEL first reported this week, a massive \$32 million, 200-employee "truck hub" is planned in southwest Allen County not far from the location of a similar facility rejected by Allen County officials early this year. This somehow seems appropriate, since county officials could soon be facing a second active lawsuit challenging their handling of development near the General Motors plant.

It's not everyday that bureaucrats manage to be sued by people on both sides of a controversial decision. But there's been little routine about growth near GM's sprawling truck plant since it opened in the mid-1980s, and recent events have illustrated how the decision-making process has been complicated by ambiguous planning guidelines, politics, public pressure and government's ever-increasing role in areas previously left to the private sector.

Grant and Stephanie Schultz filed the first lawsuit last December even before the Allen County Commissioners sided with a large number of vocal opponents and rejected Michigan-based Crown Enterprises' proposed 776,000-square-foot hub. The county's Plan Commission had approved the project in November, and a lawsuit argued the decision should be overturned because a 1985 county development plan limited industrial growth to

Gunshot victim found in alley, in critical condition

A man was in critical condition after a woman heard gunshots Wednesday afternoon and found him lying in an alley in southeast Fort Wayne.

At around 4:21 p.m. Fort Wayne Police Department officers responded to the area of Avondale Drive and Baxter Street in regards to a shooting.

The caller told police that she heard gunshots and found the unidentified man lying in the alley with gunshot wounds, according to FWPD spokesman Officer Jeremy Webb. Responding officers found the victim, whose name has not been released, in the alley just west of Avondale and north of Baxter.

The victim was taken to a local hospital in critical condition by paramedics.

People were in the area when the shooting occurred, according to Webb. Detectives interviewed potential witnesses. A K-9 unit followed a track to determine the possible path of the assailant that ended in the 4000 block of Warsaw Street, according to Webb. This incident remains under investigation by the FWPD and the Allen County Prosecutor's Office.
